The Story about Xenu

Once upon a time, 75 million years ago, there was an alien galactic Ruler named Xenu. Xenu was in charge of all the planets in this part of the galaxy, including Earth, which in those days was called Teegeeeack.

Xenu had a problem. All 76 planets of the Galactic Confederation he controlled were overpopulated. Each planet had on average 178 billion people. He wanted to get rid of this overpopulation, and he had a plan.

With the help of renegades, Xenu defeated his opponents, the good People and their Loyal Officers. Then with the help of psychiatrists and the media he persuaded billions of people to come in for income tax audits.

They were instead injected in the lungs with alcohol and glycol to paralyze them. Then they were put into spaceships that looked exactly like DC9 airplanes, except they had rocket engines instead of propellers.

These space planes then flew to planet Earth where the hundreds of billions of paralyzed people were stacked around the bases of volcanoes.

The denial of Xenu by the Church of Scientology®:

In a BBC Panorama program that aired on May 14, 2007, senior Scientologist Tommy Davis interrupts the reporter, John Sweeney when celebrity members were asked about Xenu, saying:

"None of us know what you're talking about. It's loony. It's weird."

Although Scientology has many graduated levels through which one can progress. Many who remain at lower levels in the church are unaware of much of the "space-opera" doctrines, which mostly begin at Operating Thetan level three, or "OT III". Because the information imparted to members is to be kept secret from others who have not attained that level, the member must publicly deny its existence when asked. OT III recipients must sign an agreement promising never to reveal its contents before they are given the manila envelope containing the Xenu knowledge. It is knowledge so dangerous, members are told, that anyone learning this material before he is ready could die.

Proof that the Xenu story could not have happened:

76 planets of aliens filled with 178 billion aliens per planet totals 13.528 trillion aliens that were packaged and blown up by Xenu. Hubbard did not elaborate on the number of space planes required to transport a population of some 13.5 trillion people. The Douglas DC-8, said to be an exact copy of Xenu's spaceships, seats a maximum of 250 people and has a payload of only around 40–50,000 kg, depending on the specific model. This means that, assuming the Galactic citizens had bodies about the same as humans, and the space planes were the same scale as DC-8s, only about 600 to 700 human-sized frozen bodies could have been transported on each such space plane. To accomplish the deed in a single trip, it would therefore have required around 54.1 billion planes with everyone seated or 19.3 billion planes with frozen bodies packed more efficiently.

Assuming the people were about the same size as humans, 76×178 billion $\times 2 \text{ ft}^3$ per alien is 184 cubic miles (766 km^3). This is about ten percent of the volume of the Chicxulub Crater, the site of the asteroid impact that is credited with killing the dinosaurs in the Cretaceous-Tertiary extinction event 65 mya (million years ago). The frozen bodies would have had to have been stacked a mile (1.6 km) deep, covering an area more than six miles (10 km) across around 6 volcanoes. Even assuming that they were all killed, their fossilized remains would certainly be visible in geological strata today. There is no sign of any such remains.

The energy required to blow up Xenu's victims would also have been colossal, requiring thousands of hydrogen bombs with a cumulative yield equivalent to gigatonnes of TNT. This would certainly have left physical traces; Forde lists plausible craters as the Manson crater (35 km, dated at 73.8 mya), Eagle Butte (10 km) and Dumas (2 km, both 78–74 mya). The hydrogen bombs would have left a residue of radioactive isotopes which would have been easily detectable today.

Scientology Fair Game Tactics:

Fair Game was a status assigned to those whom the Church of Scientology had officially declared to be "Suppressive Persons" or SPs. "Suppressive Persons" are those whose actions are deemed to "suppress or damage Scientology or a Scientologist." Often, this means they have been overtly critical of the church. The term "Fair Game" has also often been used to refer to a set of tactics used against perceived enemies of Scientology.

L. Ron Hubbard, the founder of Scientology, formulated the so-called "Fair Game Law" in 1965 but declared it "cancelled" only three years later in the wake of criticism from the media, courts and politicians. However, Church lawyers later admitted that the "Fair Game" policy had continued in operation until as late as 1980, when it was again officially declared "cancelled". There have been frequent allegations ever since that the policy's purpose remains in force and that "Fair Game" tactics are still used to attack perceived enemies of Scientology. The Church of Scientology has denied this, although it has also asserted that "Fair Game" is a legally protected form of "religious expression".

Fair Game still continues today:

On May 12, 2007 Journalist John Sweeney of BBC News made comments highly critical of Scientology and its teachings, and further reported that since beginning an extensive investigation he had been harassed, surveilled, and investigated by strangers. Sweeney wrote, "I have been shouted at, spied on, had my hotel invaded at midnight, denounced as a "bigot" by star Scientologists, brain-washed...and chased round the streets of Los Angeles by sinister strangers. Back in Britain strangers have called on my neighbours, my mother-in-law's house and someone spied on my wedding and fled the moment he was challenged." In another passage, "He [Scientology representative Tommy Davis] harangued me for talking to...heretics. I told him that Scientology had been spying on the BBC and that was creepy." And in another passage, "In LA, the moment our hire car left the airport we realised we were being followed by two cars. In our hotel a weird stranger spent every breakfast listening to us."

Deaths in Scientology:

There have been many cases of deaths in Scientology® the most famous case involves Lisa McPherson who in 1995 died under the care of the church.

In 1977 Lisa joined the church of Scientology®. On November 18, 1995, McPherson was involved in a minor car accident. She was apparently not hurt, but she got out of her car and took off all her clothes, and seemed mentally unstable. She was taken to a hospital where she was physically evaluated as being unharmed, but the hospital wanted her to be psychologically cared for.

With the assistance of fellow Scientologists, McPherson refused psychiatric observation or admission at the hospital and checked herself out after a short evaluation.

The Scientologists took her and isolated her, Lisa wouldn't eat solids; her diet consisted of protein shakes, vitamins and pieces of bananas.

On December 5, 1995, the Church staffers contacted David Minkoff, a Scientologist medical doctor who twice prescribed drugs (Valium and chloral hydrate) for McPherson without seeing her.

They requested for him to prescribe an antibiotic to McPherson because she seemed to have an infection. Minkoff refused and stated that McPherson should be taken to a hospital and he needed to see her before prescribing anything. They objected, expressing fear that McPherson would be put under psychiatric care. When they arrived at Minkoff's hospital 45 minutes north of Clearwater, having passed four other hospitals on the way, McPherson was found dead on arrival.

What has the Australian/Victorian Governments think about Scientology®?

The Anderson Report is the colloquial name of the report of the Board of Inquiry into Scientology, an official inquiry into the Church of Scientology® conducted for the State of Victoria, Australia. It was written by Kevin Victor Anderson QC and published in 1965.

The Anderson Report concluded that "Scientology is a delusional belief system, based on fiction and fallacies and propagated by falsehood and deception." and that it "is not, and does not claim to be, a religion". Anderson acknowledged the emotional tone of his report, justifying it as follows:

If there should be detected in this Report a note of unrelieved denunciation of scientology, it is because the evidence has shown its theories to be fantastic and impossible, its principles perverted and ill-founded, and its techniques debased and harmful. [...] While making an appeal to the public as a worthy system whereby ability, intelligence and personality may be improved, it employs techniques which further its real purpose of securing domination over and mental enslavement of its adherents. It involves the administration by persons without any training in medicine or psychology of quasi-psychological treatment, which is harmful medically, morally and socially.
